

Streetlights?

My wife's parents used to live at Mahia Beach – very beautiful spot on the east coast of the North Island; a bit north and east of Wairoa and somewhat off the main road. In

those days the roads were not sealed and there were no streetlights, not a single one. I mention this because it was there I realised what it is to experience darkness. True darkness.

I remember staying at the beach one time. It was summer but it was overcast; there were no stars and no moon. I woke up in the night and it was dark. Absolutely, totally dark. I really could not see my hand in front of my face. No cause for panic as I knew where the light switch was. However as someone who had grown up in and still lived in a city, this was an unusual experience. In the city it is never completely dark — even without the moon and stars. There is always residual light from streetlights, signs, buildings. But at Mahia Beach out on the coast, away from all that, in the middle of the night, it was totally black. I could not have found my way to the door without switching on the light. Once outside I could not have gone anywhere safely without at least a torch.

Without light our world would be a very dark and potentially dangerous place. Without streetlights, which we perhaps take for granted, on a moonless overcast night we might not even be able to safely walk around our own neighbourhood. For me this highlights (pun intended) our calling as followers of Jesus to be "streetlights".

Streetlights? Yes! At the moment with all that is happening in our world, our country, our community, it has the potential to be very negative and overwhelming. Like a huge wave of bleak, black, enveloping darkness; sweeping everything before it. Like the middle of the night at Mahia Beach. Our job as followers of Jesus is to be streetlights shining in the blackness. Just as streetlights show the way on a dark night, we are able to enable people to feel safe, find direction, experience comfort.

How? When someone lashes out verbally, angrily – respond with grace. When someone is worried, facing an uncertain future – hold out hope, offer to pray with them, point out the blessings that are around. Look out for your neighbours – make the effort to talk with them and help out as necessary. If you notice someone struggling or feeling down – drop in some baking.

Simple things perhaps. Yet it is these things that will get us all through the difficult times we are facing. It is us being points of safe, warm, welcoming, guiding light that will make the difference.

Be a streetlight in your neighbourhood.
