God and Bad Things

Last weekend I was visiting a friend who said: "I've been thinking and you're 'in the business' so maybe you can help me. Why is all this horrible

stuff happening? If God cares and God is in control how can he let it go on?" A very good question. We had a rather down to earth discussion, yet I realised there was no satisfactory answer.

Why is there a Covid-19 pandemic that has claimed so many lives and disrupted the whole world? How come an elderly couple can be defrauded of their retirement savings? Why do innocent children go hungry and uncared for? The questions go on ... and I am the first to admit that so far I have not arrived at a satisfying answer with no loose edges. Personally I believe that God cares and God is in control, though sometimes it seems this is contradictory.

So I turned to another of my "gold standard" writers, Philip Yancey, who has written a book called *Where Is God When It Hurts?* Here are some of his thoughts I have found helpful:

C. S. Lewis introduced the phrase "pain, the megaphone of God." "God whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains," he said; "it is His megaphone to rouse a deaf world." The word megaphone is apropos, because by its nature pain shouts. When I stub my toe or twist an ankle, pain loudly announces to my brain that something is wrong. Similarly, the existence of suffering on this earth is, I believe, a scream to all of us that something is wrong. It halts us in our tracks and forces us to consider other values.

We can literally become better persons because of suffering. Pain, however meaningless it may seem at the time, can be transformed. Where is God when it hurts? He is in us—not in the things that hurt—helping to transform bad into good. We can safely say that God can bring good out of evil; we cannot say that God brings about the evil in hopes of producing good.

The fact is, pain and suffering are here among us, and we need to respond in some way. The response Jesus gave was to bear the burdens of those he touched. The image of the body accurately portrays how God is working in the world. Sometimes he does enter in, occasionally by performing miracles, and often by giving supernatural strength to those in need. But mainly he relies on us, his agents, to do his work in the world. We are asked to live out the life of Christ in the world ... announce his message, work for justice, pray for mercy . . . and suffer with the sufferers.

The fact that Jesus came to earth where he suffered and died does not remove pain from our lives. But it does show that God did not sit idly by and watch us suffer in isolation. He became one of us. Thus, in Jesus, God gives us an up-close and personal look at his response to human suffering. All our questions about God and suffering should, in fact, be filtered through what we know about Jesus.

Emmanuel. God is with us, and that makes all the difference.


