
### WELCOME TO OUR CHURCH

Please keep this in mind while you are spring-cleaning, and also start preparing seedlings and cuttings for the plant stall. All donations very much appreciated!




# Harvey's Word

When I arrived at St John's Theological College as a 21 year old I was unaware of the fun that I would have chasing down all the information from the early Church about which Bishop was excommunicating which Bishop and when this was done and what was the result and so forth and so fifth. Excommunication was a fashionable trend in the early church. Orthodoxy was defined by which Bishop was willing to give you Holy Communion and, more importantly, which Bishop you were prepared to receive Holy Communion from. And it was all about trying to work out what we believe about God, Jesus and the Holy Spirit.

When a Bishop was excommunicated, they had to leave their diocese and live elsewhere. Sometimes their views came to be seen as orthodox and so they returned home, to be back in eucharistic fellowship with their people. At St John's I used to wonder what it must have been like to have been put in forced isolation from the people you have been tasked with the shepherding of their journey into faith. Now, I am not a Bishop but I am a priest. I am not in forced exile because of incorrect belief but I am in forced exile through a pesky virus that won't lie down and give up. It is a strange feeling to be sitting here on a Sunday morning knowing you are all at worship, sharing the Eucharist or the Word, thereby engaging in the worship of Almighty God.

I sometimes think about the disciples' journey to Emmaus at the end of Luke's Gospel. They did not know that their Lord had risen. They were absent from the other disciples. They felt bereft and without hope. Yet, as they walked along, in the absence of all that they had known, they found that another walked with them, explained things to them and shared his risen glory with them. And in these Covid times such journeys are also for us. And such companionship is also for us. And therefore, we have hope.
