Harvey's Word

The period 1920 – 1950 was a time of tremendous testing for Christians in Europe, especially those in Germany, Austria, Spain and Italy. What to do with the rise of Fascism and the growing desire of both Adolf

Hitler and Bruno Mussolini to be regarded as something more than just the rulers of their countries. In Germany the Protestant Church essentially split into two bodies. By far the largest group was called "The German Church," which actively encouraged and engaged with Nazi Socialism. The much smaller group coalesced around the title of "the Confessing Church". This grouping actively opposed all that Nazi Socialism stood for, Martin Niemoller, Karl Barth and Dietrich Bonhoeffer were three, amongst many others, of the notable people in the Confessing Church. In Italy things were a little different. It was in response to the way in which Mussolini and his allies were promoting the head of state as being worthy of one's total allegiance that Pope Pius XI instituted the Feast of Christ the King in his encyclical Quas primas of 192. It was the intention of Pope Pius XI to not just remind Catholic Christians but to insist to Catholic Christians that there is just one entity that is worthy of our praise, adoration, allegiance and commitment and that entity is Christ, the King. We now had the full weight of the Catholic Church promoting a Festival in direct opposition to the growing secularism and nationalism of the Italian nation state.

This Festival quickly found wide favour ecumenically and can be found in the Anglican, Presbyterian, Methodist, Moravian, Uniting, Reformed and Lutheran Churches.

So, from a simple desire by a Catholic Pope to place a road block in the ambitions of a secular and fascist political leader, the Festival has become very wide spread, even as far as Mangawhai who at some point named their Church in honour of the Christ who is indeed our King.

Aotearoa Sunday has a different trajectory. Until 1979 or thereabouts, the Bishop of Aotearoa was more properly the Assistant Bishop in the Diocese of Waiapu. This was deeply resented by the Maori people. Under the leadership of Archbishop Sir Paul Reeves and Bishop Manuhuia Bennett this changed and the Church began its journey towards its now accustomed three Tikanga partnership. The first step, which Aotearoa Celebrates is the establishment of the Bishop of Aotearoa as a full Bishop, in partnership with every Diocesan Bishop and therefore able to visit, pray with, preach, confirm and ordain without first having to seek permission from the Diocesan of that Diocese. As noted, the first step in a journey and as often happens, that first step is the hardest. Today we pray for the Archbishop of Tikanga Maori who is Archbishop Don Selwyn and we pray for the Bishop of Te Tai Tokerau who is Bishop Te Kitohi Pikaahu.
