Tony's Word

Today's gospel reading includes these words:

Jesus said, "If any want to become my followers let them deny themselves, and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it and those who lose their life for my sake will find it.

Matthew 16: 25-26

It is not surprising that many might be troubled these days by those words of Jesus. Not only do they sound most unattractive, they seem quite at odds with what most of us have been taught, which is to find our true, our authentic, selves and to cultivate a healthy self-esteem.

So what is going on here? And how are we to understand these words, which I think could hardly be less fashionable in this day-and-age?

I'm sorry, I not only have no easy answer, I have no answer that makes sense simply put in words alone. The answer to what Jesus might have meant, if there is one, is found in living the gospel. "Experientially", as some writers put it.

The paradoxes (apparent contradictions) that Jesus outlines above are testified to by countless "saints" across the ages- that is, people trying to live a gospel life according to Jesus' words and examples.

Paradoxically, such people have found that as we give ourselves in love and service to others, we find ourselves, not diminished or emptied, but filled and renewed. And one of the great ironies of life seems that if we wish to receive the best of what God has to offer, then it needs to be done with open hands - and the emptier the better.

God probably is not calling you and me to be a Mother Theresa or a St Francis (but who knows!) but I believe we are called to "let go" of some of the things we hang onto-our possessions and our sense of self-importance, for example- in order to receive the abundant blessings God has in store for us.
