Tony's Word

This morning's first lesson from the book of Exodus includes *The Ten Commandments*.

I pick number four!

At first glance, it's perhaps the least exciting of them all: "Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy." It's not really as fizzy as idolatry, murder, adultery or theft, but I think actually more relevant to most of us on our journey of faith than some of the other commandments.

To recollect, *The Ten Commandments* were given during Israel's flight from slavery under the Pharaoh in Egypt. And they left Egypt for one main reason: to be free to worship their God on the holy mountain. Keeping the Sabbath was to be an important reminder, for all time, that they lived no longer in Pharaoh's world, where they were expected to produce more and more bricks with less and less straw, seven days a week.

By the power and grace of God, they no longer lived as victims in a slave economy, but as free people in God's world.

Now, as then, the main thing the Sabbath signifies is that we too are no longer slaves, working harder and harder, producing more and more, feeding the twin idols of success and security. We also who were once no people are now the people of God, where for one day a week at least- the Sabbath- we take an increasingly unfashionable break from all the busy "making" and "doing", the striving and achieving, of the rest of the week to clear room, to make space, to worship God in freedom and in truth.

"Remember the Sabbath day and keep it holy," says the Lord.

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
